Denny's Snack Bar brings joy and appreciation to Clermont Park team members

Not many residents have shown appreciation to team members like Ina Mae "Denny" Denham.

Denny lived at Clermont Park from 2013 to 2019. She was a beloved resident who always had a huge heart for the care partners and dining team members at Clermont Park. She knew everyone's names and she was always kind and generous with compliments.

Denny received a master's degree in social work in 1959, and worked many years as a social worker in the Denver area.

Denny passed away in 2019 and left Clermont Park a very generous endowment. She did not designate what specifically she wanted her gift to be used for. Everyone who knew her was certain, however, that she would have wanted the gift to be used for the team members of Clermont Park.

Community leaders decided to honor Denny's passion for the people that work at Clermont by using her gift to provide healthy and nutritious food to team members. 

Earthen Vessel Honoree

Jean Todd is the epitome of a caring and involved "citizen" in her community, Someren Glen. In her 11 years at Someren Glen Jean led the vocal and bell choir and served on the Resident Advisory Council. During the COVID-19 pandemic she took it upon herself to call Bingo and Canasta games as well as minister to her fellow Catholic residents since volunteers were not allowed in at that time.

Jean, and her twin sister Joan were gifted musicians, singers, and dancers performing for countless organizations such as hospitals, veterans, orphanages, nursing homes and anyone in need of a reason to smile!

In 1984 Jean and a dedicated group founded "Magic Moments" to provide individuals with developmental disabilities an opportunity to perform. The troupe continues to this day, fundraising and producing performances that are life enhancing for countless people.

Distinguished Service Honoree

In her 13 years of service to CLC, **Pat McBride** forever changed our organization for the better. She created the nationally recognized clinical mentorship program, successfully guided us through the COVID-19 pandemic, and was the catalyst in the creation of our current We! Values.

Pat created the Leadership Sleepover Project, where CLC leaders spent the night in our skilled nursing neighborhoods, to gain firsthand experience in supporting residents, families, and team members. This project greatly impacted on the team, and we now offer this experience to our business partners, helping them gain a deeper knowledge of how to support CLC.

Providing a Path to Success

Christine Powers grew up among strong women. When she was just six weeks old, her family was in tragic automobile accident that killed her father. As a single parent, her mother worked as a physical therapist and raised her. She also modeled volunteering, something that has stuck with Christine. An avid volunteer, Christine served more than 17 years on the Arapahoe House board.

She and her husband, Clayton, first became familiar with Christian Living Communities through their former church. A few of their church members, mostly women, lived at Clermont Park. They knew CLC helped residents, who through no fault of their own, could no longer afford the cost of their care. That appealed to them.

When an opportunity opened to join the CLC board in 2020, Christine was inspired to serve an organization whose values aligned so closely with hers. It was through her board service during COVID that her eyes were opened to the dedication and heart that CLC care providers have for residents.

She personally knew the difference a compassionate, dedicated care partner can make, recalling the story of her cousin in Arizona whose care provider motivated her to get out of bed and regain strength. "Someone trained her how to motivate patients," Christine says.

Together, she and her husband decided they wanted to show their support for CLC care partners and give them an opportunity to grow their careers at CLC. Late last year, with a gift of \$100,000, they established the Christine and Clayton Powers Care Partner Training Fund.

The goal, they say, is to "give hope and encouragement by having a variety of ways through

training that can enhance care."

"We're hoping through training, it puts care partners in a position to stay for years. It guarantees a quality of care, and there's the potential for a lot of things."

Christine was thrilled when earlier this spring, as she participated in Eden Alternative training, she met a Holly Creek care provider who shared she knew how to help a resident with a wound as she had just completed specialized wound care training. That training was paid for through the Powers Care Partner Training Fund.

Making a difference in a way that is meaningful to you is key when it comes to philanthropic support.

That's why Clayton gives smaller gifts to provide salon services for the residents of CLC's Dayspring Villa community, where most residents are on financial assistance.

"When my mother was in an assisted living community, she loved having her hair done. That was the cat's meow," he says. Providing that type of

joy for others is very rewarding, he added.

The Powers are also members of the Compassion Circle as they have included CLC in their will to extend their legacy of providing training for team members and helping residents in need.

"What you give doesn't have to be a



lot. It's about the difference it makes," says Clayton.

CLC Nurse Who Received Scholarship Assistance Helps Other Team Members Grow

In the spring of 2021, Rachel Huntsman, the Director of Nursing at Holly Creek, was excited to return to school - despite the challenges. Her goal was to graduate from Western Governors University with a Bachelor of Science in Nursing – not an easy task at any time, and especially not when working full time and also raising two grade-school kids.

The program is self-paced, and tuition is charged per term. To reduce costs, many try to complete their courses as quickly as possible. Thanks to the generosity and kindness of supporters like you, Rachel was able to get tuition assistance from the Employee Scholarship Fund, reducing that pressure. "With the gift of the CLC Scholarship, I was able to take the time that I needed to complete the courses over a two-year time frame and not feel obligated to complete any faster," she shared.

It's a kindness that she hasn't forgotten and strives to pay forward. Alice Bomboma, a long-time Holly Creek CNA, also received help from the Scholarship Fund to complete nursing school this spring. With Rachel cheering her on, Alice was able to complete her onsite clinical training right at Holly Creek. "Nursing school and 'clinicals' can be very overwhelming and even intimidating!" Rachel explained. "But by providing Alice with an environment that was familiar to her, she was able to experience the full value of the 60 hours of clinical training, surrounded by people that were invested in her as a nurse and as a co-worker."

Alice was so grateful for the support of Rachel and the other nurses at Holly Creek. "I was so excited to go to Holly Creek because it is like a second home to me. I knew they have amazing nurses there. It helped me learn a lot – I didn't feel bad if I asked questions" she said.

Receiving the blessing of support for her own career motivates Rachel to continue supporting the growth of other nurses at CLC. "Many of us were raised in the 'eat your young' healthcare environment," Rachel observed. "I am proud to say that we are NOT THOSE NURSES ANYMORE!"


